CULTURAL CAPITAL

Our Cultural Capital provision remains a high priority for our learners this academic year. Providing each year group with a free opportunity to raise aspirations and increase engagement in the wider world.

This term, our Year 7 experienced their annual cultural capital experience with a visit to Beaudesert Activity Centre. With an aim of team building, overcoming challenges and building relationships - the Year 7 cohort eagerly participated in High Ropes, Caving, Pedal karts, Archery, Tomahawks and more.

In the Spring term we have two Cultural Capital Visits: Year 9 will visit Universities on the week of 15th January and Year 8 will visit Black Country Living Museum either Wednesday 21st February (C Band) or Friday 23rd February (H band)



ARMY AND ROYAL NAVY **EXPERIENCES**

It was a privilege to host several opportunities before Armistice Day at Cockshut Hill School. We had a visit from The Royal Navy who gave an assembly and engaged with the whole of Year 8. Our learners were informed about what The Royal Navy do at sea and on land and given insight in the range of different careers that are available to them in the future. Year 8 attended an interactive workshop where they were given a 'Rescue Me' scenario. The Royal Navy is involved around the world in humanitarian support, if a ship gets into difficulty at sea, they will send out a Mayday call which will notify other vessels in the area. Using STEM - Science Aerodynamics and Velocity learners had to build a signal flare. Their paper flares were challenged to see how well they flew into the air - would they be rescued? There were some interesting builds, and earmarked some truly talented engineers of the future!



In addition, we welcomed The Army who also provided an assembly about the different careers it currently has on offer and a carousel of interactive lifeskill events for our Year 9 learners. There was an array of different stations, where learners had to use their skills to overcome barriers.



Station 1: Snakes and Ladders, learners had to reach the highest point without falling.

- 2: Blind Build using walkie talkies learners had to their communication skills to describe how to build an object.
- 3: Maze Runner: learners were blindfolded and with the help of a partner tackled walking through a maze with obstacles.
- 4: Sensei's Conquest: Learners were blindfolded to complete an array of different shapes using chopsticks.
- 5: Engineering quest: Learners had their engineering skills put to the test by building the schools largest tower using limited

Both events created a great buzz around school and our young people thoroughly enjoyed learning about our Armed Forces





STEM EXPERIENCES

On Wednesday 29th November, 60 of our Year 9 learners participated in a Computer Science STEM Day, working with the Smallpeice Trust and Amazon Web Services. The challenge for the day was to build an Autonomous Vehicle.

With driverless cars now becoming a reality after once being consigned to the pages of science-fiction, the world needs a new wave of engineers and programmers to design, build and programme the next generation of autonomous vehicles. Our learners got to build their own vehicle using Lego Mindstorms, adding the computer components and then using iPads to create coding and programming their car to navigate and drive itself without any human interaction.

Learners was able to earn employability skills badges throughout the day ranging from: Listening, Speaking, Problem Solving, Creativity, Staying Positive, Aiming High, Leadership and Teamwork. They learnt how they can transfer these skills into future employment.



The STEM Day also allowed learners to obtain the BSA Discovery Crest Award, which means all participating learners will receive a CREST Discovery Award in exchange for some written reflective exercises.



INTRODUCTION OF OUR PRAISE SYSTEM
